



Anticipating Revival: International Convocation 2012

Patriarch Craig Bates and I visited Spain several weeks ago. The Patriarch went to help the CEC in Europe plan for the International Convocation that will take place July 2012 in the city of Madrid, and I was given opportunities to encourage the faithful in Europe to stand strong in their belief that "All Life is Sacred."

There could not be a better time for our convocation to take place in Europe. Church attendance in France, Sweden and the Netherlands is less than 10% in some areas. And as attendance dwindles, so does attention to the traditions and beliefs that the Church has always encouraged. Simple things that, when ignored, produce much more complicated ramifications.

For example, the belief that children are a blessing. Europe is not a country that encourages their people to have kids. In an article in *USA Today*, director of the World Values Survey Ronald Inglehart says, "The biggest single consequence of the declining role of the church is the huge decline in fertility rates." World Values Survey is a Swedish-based group that has tracked the beliefs of more than eighty societies around the globe. For Europe, lower fertility means fewer people entering the workforce. Over time countries like Italy, Germany and France won't be able to maintain the generous welfare programs that have given most workers a lifetime of economic security. Simple beliefs. Complicated ramifications.

This is one of many reasons that I believe the year 2012 is to be greatly anticipated by the congregations in the CEC. Not only will we be gathering for our convocation, we will be gathering in a place that God can use his three streams to water a dry and weary land. This convocation isn't just about our church meeting, it's about our church ministering, especially in the area of Life. And European CEC leaders like Bishop Elmer Belmonte and Bishop Felicísimo are very excited to host their brothers and sisters from around the world.

Before leaving the city, the Patriarch and I were also privileged to speak to the Congregation of St. John the Apostle. During my time with them, I encouraged

those in attendance to follow the example of their children. In order to illustrate the simplicity of a child's faith, I asked a small girl in the congregation to come up front with me. I asked her, "Do you like little babies? Do you think anyone should be allowed to hurt them?"

The little girl gave me a very beautiful but very puzzled look. After a quiet moment, it occurred to me that she did not speak English, so I tried again. Only this time I made the attempt in Spanish. When she still did not answer, I started to suspect that my Spanish was not as practiced as I had hoped.

Thankfully, one of the native priests stepped to my rescue and asked the poor girl properly. Once she understood, she quickly looked up at me and answered that of course she liked little babies and of course no one should hurt them. The congregation laughed with us, but the illustration was successful.

From Madrid, we proceeded to Barcelona to join Archbishop Hines and Bishop Felicísimo Cordero for the 25th Anniversary celebration of St. James the Lesser. The service displayed complete surrender to the Holy Spirit as God moved through the music, liturgical dance, and a powerful sermon by the Patriarch that concluded with the celebration of Holy Eucharist.

After the service, the congregation honored and blessed all in attendance with skits, dances, music and drama that highlighted ancient Filipino and Spanish culture.

The European clergy and churches from Spain, Portugal, France, and Belgium are extremely excited by the Patriarch's visit. And the Patriarch is equally excited about the plans they've made for convocation. We are all anticipating great spiritual renewal and revival when the worldwide CEC faithful gather in July of 2012. *You* do not want to miss this great gathering. I encourage each of you to start saving your money and making plans now, and I'll see you all in Madrid.

Broken Vessels, Broken Bodies, and A Generation's Call to Life

In 2005, I went to my first March for Life. Two months after that I took my first Ireland trip with CEC For Life, and a few months after that, my second Ireland trip, for the road show with Youth Defence. It was a year of favor from the Lord for me, and it was a season of planting. During those events God instilled a passion in me to protect the unborn that has never been forgotten, never been quenched--it is there, I faithfully believe, forever. But it began in Washington D.C., in damp twenty-two degree weather, where I stood with thousands of people in front of the Supreme Court, realizing at last that I was not the only one who felt this call, and ardently prayed for God to end abortion.

March For Life 2005 was an eye-opener, a kick-start, it was any word you want to choose that communicates the beginning of a new work in Christ. And it's an experience that is absolutely irreplaceable.

This generation is being slaughtered daily by the act of abortion, and the men and women who have fought it since the seventies cannot live forever. It is up to us, the generation that has become so intimately acquainted with death, to stand against abortion. To be broken vessels for the cause of Life. Because we are the ones that it's killing, and we are the people whose friends come to us terrified because they're pregnant, or weeping because they've chosen to have an abortion. When you look into the face of a young person, you are looking at the frontline of abortion, at the very ground that the enemy wishes to steal, kill, and destroy. But you are also looking at a plan and a future. You are looking at a generation that God is calling forward.

Leaders, Rectors, Parents: Do something this January that will truly save a life. Take your young people to the March. Position them to catch the fire that God is instilling in the hearts

of His youth, and, in doing so, put them in the fight. It's the place that God has led us, and, together, I earnestly believe that we can end the killing.

Fr. Terry and I asked some youth and youth leaders from the CEC to tell us how spending time at the the March For Life has affected them, and why they think it's so important for the youth to attend. Read their responses, pray for wisdom and provision. Hopefully I will see you all very soon.
